

# The Royal Program



The Fiesta Especial® Royal Court is a leadership and life skills development program for individuals with disabilities. Through this program, participants have numerous opportunities to learn and develop skills in social environments, leadership interactions, problem solving, communication and more.

### WHO CAN PARTICIPATE

Children and adults with disabilities who would like to develop their leadership and life skills through a community training and instruction program.

Target Age Range: 10 and up

Our oldest participant so far was 52.

### Fiesta Especial Royal Court

- 20 Qualified individuals, ages 10 years and up, with a physical, cognitive or sensory disability will serve in title positions on the court.
- King (1), Queen (1), Prince (1), Princess (1), and 2 or more Duke/Duchess, Marquis/Marquess, Count/Countess, Baron/Baroness, and Page.
- Program participants must agree to minimum appearance and attendance requirements. King and Queen are expected to participate above the minimum requirements.

Candidates qualify for title positions on the Fiesta Especial® Royal Court with their fundraising campaigns from September - December.


(August 28<sup>th</sup> – DECEMBER 3<sup>rd</sup>)



# **AWARENESS**



#### I PLEDGE TO...

#### Be accepting

of other people's differences.

#### Be aware that some disabilities are invisible

I will be respectful of another person's need to have accommodations without questioning their reasons for asking for special help and supports.

#### Speak directly to people with disabilities

Even when it might be easier to turn to a family member, friend, interpreter, or caregiver who may be present, I will speak directly to the person I am speaking with.

#### **Use People First language**

I will use language that refers to the person first, not their disability. The way we speak or write about someone influences the images and attitudes we form, leaving behind a positive or negative impression for others.

#### Assume ability and intellect

I will use respectful, age-appropriate language and tone of voice that I would use with anyone else.

#### Ask before helping others

I will ask permission before assisting someone, understanding they may need my help or may be capable of accomplishing the task on their own.

#### Be informed

I will increasing my knowledge and understanding about disabilities to make my community a more inclusive place for everyone.

### 6 Tips to HELP SOMEONE WITH ADHD AND DYSLEXIA

#### Be Patient.

We will understand things if you give us time, sometimes you have to use different methods, like videos and songs to help us learn.

#### Make reading active.

Find libraries with play areas or read in parks. It helps to use up some excess energy and then read for short periods rather than trying to read for long periods.

#### Find out what we like and read it.

When I was younger, I really liked cooking, so we started with reading Cookbooks, that helped me build confident with reading. Now I read Japanese Mangas, I really enjoy reading with my friends now.

#### Know that I need help to calm down.

ADHD makes you feel very nervous, so it is hard to relax. I use blowing bubbles, favorite music and a quiet environment to help me get calm. A lot of people don't realize that we don't have any control of my emotions and it is scary for me. By being supportive and not making a big deal about it, you can help me feel better about it.

#### Be active.

Doing activities, walking, swimming or going outside helps to use up excess energy so that I can focus on a task, especially if I feel nervous about it. Working on something for long periods of time makes me feel stuck.

#### Be our friend.

Often people feel alone, like they are the only one with this problem, or people treat them different.

We are creative, fun and weird in the best way, so be our friend and we will all have a blast.

### DOWN SYNDROME

Down syndrome occurs when an individual has a full or partial extra copy of chromosome 21. This alters the course of development and causes the characteristics associated with Down syndrome.

Down syndrome is the most commonly occuriring chromosomal condition. Approximately one in every 700 babies in the U.S. is born with Down Syndrome.

People with Down syndrome have an increased risk for some medical conditions such as congenital heart defects, respiratory and hearing problems, Alzheimer's disease, childhood leukemia and thyroid conditions.

Some common physical traits of Down syndrome are: low muscle tone, small stature, an upward slant to the eyes, and a single deep crease across the center of the palm. Every person with Down syndrome is a unique individual and may possess these characteristics to different degrees or not at all.

Life expectancy for a person with Down syndrome has increased dramatically from 25 in 1983 to over 60 years of age today!

Down syndrome is not an illness or a disease, it is a developmental disability. All people with Down syndrome experience cognitive delays, but the effect is usually mild to moderate and it is not indicative of the many strengths and talents of each individual.

Quality educational programs, a stimulating home environment, good health care and positive support from family, friends and the community enable people with all types of diifferences to be active, engaged, and contributing citizens. People with Down syndrome go to college, work, get married, volunteer and live independently.

### Submission Deadlines:

- Program applications are due no later than Friday, August 28<sup>th</sup> at 5pm
- All campaign funds raised are due by <u>7:00pm on Friday, December 4<sup>th</sup></u> at the offices of disABILITYsa. Fundraising totals are based on the actual amount submitted and received for each candidate.
- 40% Return: The first \$250 of the funds will be towards a disABILITYsa basic nonprofit membership. Forty percent of the funds raised will be submitted to a preapproved nonprofit organization serving individuals with disabilities of the candidate's choice at the Coronation. All undesignated funds will remain with Fiesta Especial® to cover costs of Celebration Day.

(W-9 Required with Nomination Submission)

• **Sponsorship Sharing:** for campaign contributions received at the \$1,000 amount or higher, Fiesta Especial® will work with you on recognizing your donor as a sponsor of the Royal Court throughout the Fiesta® season.

### OTHER INFORMATION CONT.

• **Program Funding:** 100% of the campaign contributions (minus credit card processing fees) are distributed to the Fiesta Especial® Celebration Day program at disABILITYsa and the nonprofit disability service organization of the candidates choice.

None of the funds raised through the campaigns are used in the operation of the Royal Court program. Funds raised by disABILITYsa Staff and Volunteers are used to support the operations and purchase materials for the Royal Court program.
